TO PREVENT THE SELLING OF WINE AND SPIRITS TO SOLDIERS OR TO SHIPS OF HER MAJESTY'S NAVY AND OTHER OFFENCES.

Punishment  
for selling  
liquor to  
soldiers.

1. Any person who in the neighbourhood of any military camp or cantonment, without authority of the officer commanding such camp or cantonment, shall sell wine or spirits to any soldier shall, upon conviction before the officer commanding the camp or cantonment, be liable to a fine not exceeding five pounds, or to imprisonment with hard labour for one month, or both.

2. It shall not be lawful for any person to bring on board any of Her Majesty's ships or vessels any spirituous or fermented liquor of any description without the previous consent of the officer commanding the ship or vessel on board of which the same may be brought.

Power to  
search boats  
and seize  
spirits, etc.

3. Any officer in Her Majesty's service, or warrant or petty officer of the navy, or warrant officer or non-commissioned officer of marines, with or without seamen or persons under his command, may search any vessel approaching or which may have approached any of Her Majesty's ships or vessels; and if any spirituous or fermented liquor is found on board such boat or vessel may seize such spirituous or fermented liquor, and it shall be forfeited to Her Majesty.

Penalty on  
offenders.

4. Any person who shall bring any spirituous or fermented liquor on board any of Her Majesty's ships or vessels without the previous consent of the officer commanding the ship or vessel, or shall approach any of Her Majesty's ships or vessels for the purpose of bringing any spirituous or fermented liquor on board without such previous consent, or for the purpose of giving or selling without such previous consent spirituous or fermented liquor to men in Her Majesty's service, or of aiding or assisting any officer, seaman, or marine in Her Majesty's service to desert or improperly absent himself from his ship or vessel, shall be liable to a fine not exceeding three pounds.

Aiding  
desertion, etc.

5. Any officer in Her Majesty's service or warrant or petty officer of the navy or warrant officer, or non-commissioned officer of marines, or any peace officer, may with or without any warrant or other process apprehend or cause to be apprehended any person committing an offence against the provisions of this Law, and bring him or cause him to be brought before a Magisterial Court for the purpose of having him summarily convicted of such offence. Power to apprehend offender.

6. This Law may be cited as the Wines and Spirits (Sale to Short title. Soldiers and Sailors) Law, 1879.

TO PROVIDE FOR THE REGULATION OF WIRELESS TELEGRAPHY.

Law 9 of 1913 (at p. 969) has been amended by the addition thereto of the following section:-

The expression "transmission" where used in section 2 and section 6 of the Principal Law relating to messages includes, and shall be deemed always to have included, the reception as well as the sending of messages.

The High Commissioner in Council may whenever he shall deem it expedient to do so licence the establishment of any wireless telegraph station or the installation or working of any apparatus for wireless telegraphy in any place in Cyprus or on board any ship registered in Cyprus.
