BE it enacted :-

1. This Law may be cited as the Recovery of Compensa- short title. tion for Injury to Property (Amendment) Law, 1937, and shall be read as one with the Recovery of Compensation for Injury to Property Laws, 1930 to 1935, (hereinafter 12 of 1930 called "the Principal Law"), and the Principal Law and 28 of 1932 this Law may together be cited as the Recovery of 24 of 1933 Compensation for Injury to Property Laws, 1930 to 1937.

1. This Law may be cited as the Births and Deaths Short title. Registration (Amendment) Law, 1937, and shall be read as one with the Births and Deaths Registration Laws, 1895 16 of 1895 and 1928, (hereinafter called "the Principal Law"), and the Principal Law and this Law may together be cited as the Births and Deaths Registration Laws, 1895 to 1937.
