A LAW TO AMEND THE AGRICULTURAL PRODUCE (EXPORT) LAW. CAP. 39

Governor.

BE it enacted by His Excellency the Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Colony of Cyprus as follows :—

1. This Law may be cited as the Agricultural Produce (Export) (Amendment) Law, 1954, and shall be read as one with the Agricultural Produce (Export) Law (hereinafter referred to as "the principal Law").

2. Section 2 of the principal Law is hereby amended by the deletion of the definition of "agricultural produce" therein and the substitution therefor of the following definitions :—

" 'agriculture' includes horticulture, fruit growing, seed production, dairy farming and animal breeding and keeping and 'agricultural' shall be construed accordingly ;
'agricultural produce' means the products of agricultural operations in the Colony set out in the First Schedule to this Law, and includes articles of food or drink wholly or partly manufactured or derived from any such product set out in the said Schedule :

Provided that the Governor-in-Council may from time to time add to, delete from, substitute for or vary, anything mentioned in that Schedule."

3. Section 8 of the principal Law is hereby amended as follows :—

(a) by the substitution for paragraph (e) thereof of the following paragraph :—

" (e) the regulation of the erection and licensing of buildings for storage, grading, blending, packing and treatment of agricultural produce, the maintenance of such buildings in a clean and sanitary condition and the fees to be paid for such licensing ;"

(b) by the insertion, immediately after paragraph (g) thereof of the following paragraphs (the ensuing paragraphs (h) and (i) being relettered as paragraphs (j) and (k), respectively) :—

" (h) the control of the methods to be followed in the picking, conveyance, handling, stacking or loading of the agricultural produce, the precautions to be taken by persons engaged therein and generally the protection of such produce from damage ;

(i) the determination of the type of ships by which the agricultural produce shall be conveyed and the class of accommodation to which any such produce may be consigned and the manner in which such produce shall be stored ;"

4. Sub-section (1) of section 9 of the principal Law is hereby amended by the substitution for the words "a fine not exceeding fifty pounds" (line 8) of the words "imprisonment not exceeding six months or to a fine not exceeding one hundred pounds or to both such imprisonment and fine".

5. For the First Schedule to the principal Law the following is substituted :—
