Short title.

1. This Law may be cited as the Diplomatic Privileges (European Commission of Human Rights) Law.

2. Members of the European Commission of Human Rights, and their official staffs accompanying them as members, shall enjoy—

- (a) while exercising their functions as such, and during their journeys to and from the place of meeting, immunity from personal arrest or detention and from seizure of their personal baggage and inviolability for all papers and documents;
- (b) immunity from legal process of every kind in respect of words spoken or written and all acts done by them in their capacity as members.
